Growing through Tough Times

The past couple months have been days like no others. We have been told to stay at home and practice "social distancing." Large gatherings have been strictly prohibited. Which means normal Sunday worship in churches is out. What a problem! What frustration! What good can come out of this Coronavirus mess?

I firmly believe that our sovereign God has all things in His control, and this pandemic is no exception. God has this, and us, in His powerful, loving hands. I also believe that God does not waste, so there must be some good reasons for this, with certain good to come out of it. Scripture assures us that God causes all things to work for good to those who love Him. So let's examine this a bit.

Having more time at home is not all bad. It gives us extra time to rest, read, and reflect, to organize things, and to build family relationships.

In reading through the prophets at the end of the Old Testament with our confirmation class recently, it struck me how often the prophets rebuked God's people for wrongdoing and urged them to return to their Lord.

People of God were told repeatedly to seek the Lord God. How do we do that? Primarily in two ways. First, we seek the Lord as we listen to Him speaking to us in His Word. Have you used extra time these past few weeks to let God speak with you in His Word, the Holy Bible? A second way to seek the Lord is to speak with Him in prayer and tell Him the concerns on our heart. As God speaks to us and we speak back to Him, our relationship is built and strengthened. I am much blessed when members tell me that they are spending more time than normal in Bible reading and in prayer during these days.

What are some other thoughts to think on at this time? Here are a few notes from my journal.

- This is a time & call for <u>repentance</u>, <u>prayer</u>, and <u>simplicity</u>. Do we have <u>too</u> much?
- <u>Seek God</u> while He may be found and where He may be found. (Isaiah 55:6)
- <u>Read</u> some good books, the Good Book, and get some <u>exercise</u> & fresh air.
- Consider what <u>great things God has done</u>. Ponder the mighty works of God.
- We are in this together, and together we will make it through—better and stronger as God refines us & builds His character in us.
- Realize sanctification and <u>character</u> come from struggles and suffering.
- <u>Memorize</u> Scripture, hymns, and the catechism.

- *Strategize for the future. Time to update & use technology.*
- *Develop the discipline of <u>prayer/devotions</u>*. *Search the Psalms*.
- Write a note of encouragement or call someone. Brighten their day!
- Realize the importance of <u>face-to-face</u> gatherings. We are social beings.
- <u>Rest</u> in the protection, providence, presence, pardon, power, & peace of God.

Though the future is uncertain, our God is faithful, sure, dependable, and unchanging. We hope to be back in "regular" worship soon. Meanwhile, let's not waste these days! Let's not only **go** through them, but also **grow** through them!

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

Church Worship Service Options Meeting May 18, 2020

Meeting Called to Order

Pastor opened with reading the book of Acts 1 - in recognition of May 21 being Ascension Day. Jesus had completed His early work: He lived. He died. He rose.

This meeting was called together by the Elders with concerns that the crisis of Covid -19 virus has mandated the absence of church services for several weeks. Due to Covid – 19 restrictions regarding gatherings, attendance for this meeting was limited to 10 members.

The finances of the church were briefly discussed. Currently, the church has a loan of \$18,000 with Alliance Bank. The Church/School has received monies through the Covid -19 Government Grant for teacher wages. The Church may be able to make a major payment towards the loan with the offering monies that have been received during the Covid-19 shut down.

It was discussed that it is difficult to make decisions without knowing what the Governor is going to present on June 1 regarding shut downs and restrictions. It was hoped that our first Church Service could be June 7 in which we could celebrate Easter and share communion in the church. An evening service for the Confirmands' questioning with only family present will be held on June 3rd. Also would like to do something with the 8th graders and the seniors graduating from high school. This may not be feasible due to the proposed restrictions.

Members reviewed the proposed protocols for beginning Public Worship Services during the Covid-19 crisis. This would include personal separation of six feet, sanitizing before and after each service, one way traffic patterns, facemasks, signage, limited use of hymnals, ventilation, restroom limitations as well as gathering limit of 1/3 of church capacity. It possibly would mean more than one service and possibly held on other days of the week than Sunday. It was felt this would be very difficult to be in compliance.

There was further discussion on how other churches have handled Church services over the past few weeks doing parking lot services. It was decided that the Elders will plan a parking lot Church Service to be held on May 31. The tentative plan will be to use a microphone system and borrow Redeemer's transmitter as a backup. Church service would begin at 10:30 am and last about 40 minutes. There will be need of ushers (possibly council members) directing traffic, distributing bulletins, and collecting the offering. Communion possibly would be included as a drive up for future services.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

My life here in the 1st world is full of anxiety...and yet while in Guatemala I saw that the people had next to nothing and yet were still so content. Jesus says, "Which of you by worrying can add a single cubit to his stature?" I saw the truth of this reflected in our trip. Through extensive planning based on (inaccurate) numbers, we planned games, activities, and a gift of an Easter arch book for each child and yet I was still anxious that we wouldn't be prepared. When we arrived, we learned that...we were indeed not prepared. There were nearly 100 more students enrolled in the Prek-6th grade school than we had thought! Cue more worry and anxiety. Through some frantic math, we realized that we had EXACTLY enough arch books for all kids in grades 1-3, EXACTLY enough Garden Bibles for 5th grade + teachers, and enough T-shirts for the other kids. It was not what we had planned at all but it worked out PERFECTLY, reminding us that God's ways are better than our ways.
